History

Developed in 2012 to address two industry challenges:

1. Supporting storm response across network boundaries
2. Providing contractors with a consistent framework across multiple networks

Originally known as the Electricity Distribution Industry Training & Competency Framework (EDITC)

Common – Shared industry language

Usable – Practical and workable

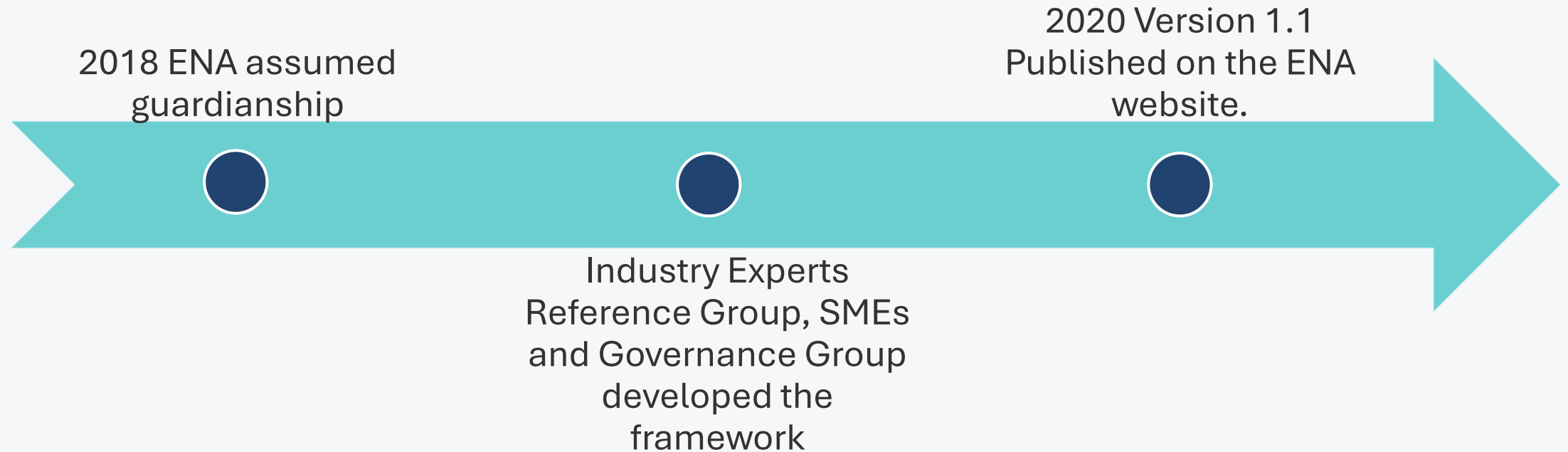
Transportable – Recognised across organisations

Auditable – Evidence based and verifiable

Updateable – Adapts to industry change

History

From Concept to Industry Framework



Built by industry, for industry.

Developed collaboratively by networks, contractors, training providers and industry experts.

Current Situation

Industry Led – Networks, contractors, training providers, WDC, Connexis, ENA and EEA

Continuously Reviewed – Comprehensive framework review completed

Current –Version 1.9 is the latest published version

Fit for Purpose – No additional classes required. The numbering structure remains unchanged.

Focus is shifting from framework development to industry adoption

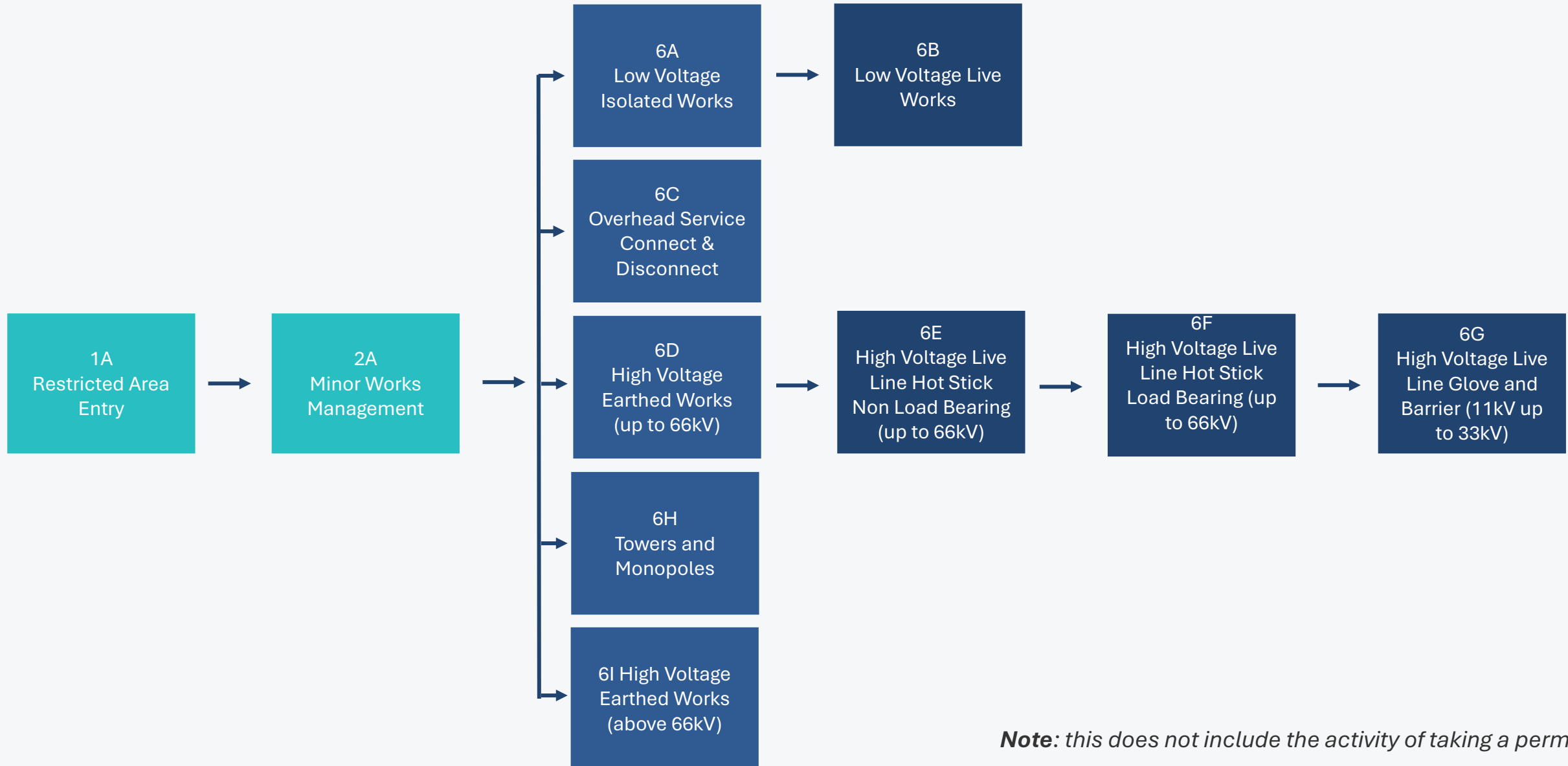

What is next for the CCF

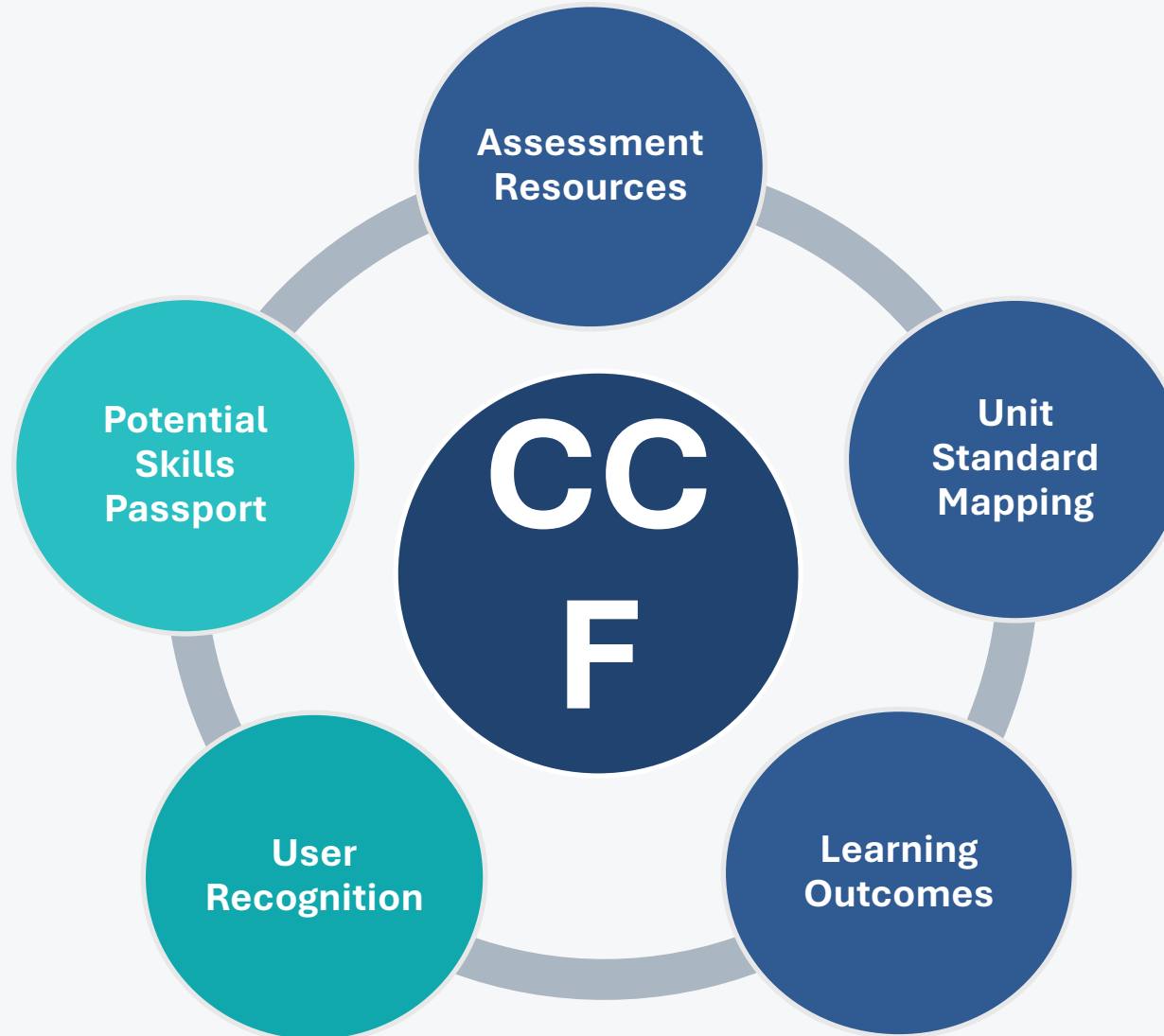
Reenergise identified common competency frameworks as a key enabler of workforce capability
